1. That the S.R.C. strongly re-affirms its commitment to full homosexual rights that was made by the S.R.C.'s delegation to the AUS Annual Council 1976. Specifically re-affirmed are Motions F.18 to wit, That sexual acts between consenting parties should be legalised; such legislation being the first step in a campaign to re-orient society's attitude to homosexuality'. and F.19, to wit, 'That discrimination by employers be made illegal.' and further in accordance with this policy that the S.R.C. publicise its position in its own media and in the local community press, the latter being by advertisement, paid if necessary, the purpose of this being the promotion of free debate in accordance with its constitution. Should significant student protest be lodged against the S.R.C.'s commitment of support for this oppressed minority group, then, at the discretion of the President, a General Meeting of Students should be convened to debate and vote on motions F.18 and F.19 above. Further that the NSW State Government and the Australian Commonwealth Government through the respective Parliamentary Representatives of the Wagga electorate be informed of the S.R.C.'s position, as should the Wagga City Council through the Mayor of Wagga.

Further more in accordance with the above policy the S.R.C. affirms that it would take the strongest possible action to defend any student overtly or covertly penalised within our community for the adoption and full expression of a homosexual life-style.

2. The S.R.C. requests the Students Representative on the College Council to move in Council a motion that would convey the meaning of the following points:

1. That the S.R.C. recognises that while the College Council under the Parliamentary Act of its creation cannot act contrary to the laws of the State of N.S.W., that the College Council nevertheless recognises the stand taken by the democratically elected representatives of the R.C.A.E. student community in free debate at this S.R.C. meeting in relation to those persons who are penalised and hindered by their living of a homosexual lifestyle.
2. That the Student's Representative Council requests the College Council to re-affirm the policy that no student will be penalised because of a homosexual life-style.
3. That in accordance with the previous policy motions of the S.R.C. that the S.R.C. affirms that:
 - (a) It will support any student who may lose his/her Dept. of Education scholarship or other sponsorship because of his/her homosexual life-style especially by way of making representations to the Dept. of Education or relevant sponsoring body:
 - (b) It will make representations to the N.S.W. Minister for Education requesting that it be declared departmental policy that there be no discrimination in awarding or continuing scholarships or the allocation of teaching posts on the grounds of sexual preference. The Minister should further be requested to ensure that anti-discrimination legislation regarding sex and sexual preference be drafted and put before the Legislative Assembly at the earliest possible date.

4. That the S.R.C., realizing the inadequacy of current sex education programmes and mindful of the fact that it stands in a special relationship to the teaching profession in that the majority of students at this College are in training for that profession, requests the N.S.W. Minister for Education to allow homosexual persons the opportunity to present to pupils in schools a positive view of homosexuality as an acceptable lifestyle and to allow such homosexual persons to counsel pupils who may request such counselling.

5. That two screen printed posters be produced under the direction of the A.U.S. Secretary expressing the S.R.C.'s position on homosexuality, to encourage debate in the wider community concerning attitudes and values towards both heterosexuality and homosexuality. That \$.50 be allocated towards the production and distribution of these posters.

6. The S.R.C. requests the College to transfer the area of study of homosexuality from Abnormal Psychology (Psychology of the Person 11) to a non-judgemental area of social study, preferably Sociology. This being in accordance with the S.R.C.'s belief that homosexuality like heterosexuality is not a sickness but a normal personality variable. This being in accordance with the majority decision of the Australian Psychiatric Association.

7. That the S.R.C. requests the Union Board of Management to clearly express a policy regarding homosexually oriented students particularly, that homosexual students (as for all students who pay the General Service Fee), whether as couples or individuals have an equal right to belong to, attend and participate in all clubs and functions (under the U.B.M. Constitution) on the same basis as heterosexual couples and individuals. Furthermore, that as a minority group their rights should be expressly protected to prevent exploitation or abuse, either physically or emotionally. This request to be presented to the U.B.M. by Liason Officer as soon as possible and to be reported on at the next S.R.C. meeting.

8. The S.R.C. requests the Director of Students Services to make available facilities and resources to the Rivcoll Homosexual Collective for meetings to develop a community spirit amongst homosexual and lesbian students, and concomitant with this that the Student Counsellor and Doctor be requested to advise any homosexual student who may consult them of the campus homosexual group and tell them whom to contact.
