CORRUPTION? RIGGED S.R.C. ELECTIONS?

A candidate for the coming S.R.C. elections has been spreading the word around college that the S.R.C. elections will have no chance of being fair, since I am the returning officer, and I'll have no compunction about rigging the ballot. The initial reason for this smear is fairly obvious - since the person concerned is a candidate himself for a second year position - and there were 13 candidates for only 5 positions. The accusation was made chiefly to the other second year candidates and they were urged to withdraw their nominations - "since they would have no chance of success in a totally rigged election." One of these candidates subsequently withdrew - lessening the competition against the person making the claims. Another applied to withdraw but was talked out of it. This cynical political ploy from a person who has used such smear tactics before, could perhaps have been dismissed as clever campaigning at the expense of someone else's reputation - and possibly ignored. However, I am not prepared to ignore this smear - which the perpetrator knows is false. The fact that this candidate claims on his nomination to be A CHRISTIAN adds further insult to the accusations (although I personally can't claim to be surprised by this typical lack of fairness, charity and honesty in a fundamentalist "christian." It is this sort of thing which causes people to be disgusted at organised christianity). The point of this article is to answer the allegations and to assure the voters. In the 2½ years I have worked for the S.R.C. here, I have been totally impressed by the absolute honesty in all matters - of all the student representatives, and the idea of tampering with elections is obviously out of the question with everyone. This sort of thing just does not go on. As returning officer for this election I will see to it that the tradition of absolute fairness is upheld. Unlike this declared "christian" campaigner, I have a strong sense of honesty and fairness.
