ROLE TAKING WORKSHOP

3rd - 5th June

R.C.A.E.

- * What are we doing when we take on and build a Role?
- * What does observing this process tell us about ourselves and others?
- * In what ways can we use Role as a method for self-discovery?

The aim of this Workshop is to explore the use of Role-Play both as a dramatic technique and as a means of personal development. It has particular relevance for those people involved in Drama, Teaching and the Social Services, as well as being a useful tool for those people who want to learn more about themselves, their actions, and how they relate to others.

The major emphasis will be on evolving an understanding of the processes involved, acquiring relevant skills, and building an awareness of the advantages and difficulties associated with the use of Role taking as a method.

It will be an experimental learning workshop, not lectures. The group leader is Kerry Macrae who has been involved in drama and human relations work for some years both with the Educational Drama Association of N.S.W. and CAHRA (Community Advancement Through Human Relations and the Arts.)
