

Three carloads of students from Rivcoll attended to march in the rally that left ANU ending at Parliament House. Ihanks to all the Rivcoll students who attended it was interesting to note that all the Rivcoll demonstrators bar two were women good on you girls!

AUS.

AUS are currently launching a \$100,000 education fight-back fund to persuade the government to re-think its reduced funding in the educational sector. Likwise the ACIU are also launching a \$1,000,000 fight-back campaign against the Razor Gangs recommendations.

Goulburn Amalgamation

At this stage the amalgamation between Goulburn and wagga is still proceeding. After the Razor Gang's report the College Council and in particular the Principal are now seriously questioning whether or not they can make the amalgamation work. This is due to the reduced funding that the combined Colleges will receive from the Frazer Government during the next few years.

Momever it appears that the State Government is still pursuing amalgamation at this stage.

Next week the Hagan Committee which has been empowered to oversee the smooth operation of the amalgamation, will be in Wagga and will be taking submissions from persons who are willing to contribute to the Committee.


If you are willing to make a submission about this College or the amalgamated College then please do so next week.

College Council

This week the good news about the College Council (next week the bad news). At the meeting of the College Council held on the 8th May at Albury, College Council unanimously approved my motion condemning the Federal Government for its educational cutbacks and its introduction of tertairy fees for students who are undertaking second and post-graduate courses Well done College Council!

Conservatism/Right Wing Governments The Sydney Morning Herald on Saturday 23rd May and the Sun Herald the following day, carried many articles that, when put together, means that the established press are now

questioning in depth the motives and the





This is a rather radical step, especially for a normally conservative paper such as the Herald to undertake.

For example, I will mention a number of articles and what they said without adding my own personal comments.

In America the Reagan administration are now embracing the Moonie cult that has been known in the past for its subversion,

indoctrination and kidnapping methods to gain recruits. Sun Myung Moon of the Moonies is becoming more "respectable" to

America as a religion due to their ever-growing billion dollar religious and financial empire.

In Australia the Government is now 'questioned about a possible secret treaty allowing the Americans to carry nuclear weapons into Australia. The reason for this is the disclosure this week about a secret agreement between the Japanese government and American Government that has

just been learned about. The paralels between Australia and its Darwin base and the events in Japan are almost identical.



Another article stated how the Menzies Government hoodwinked the Australian people into believing that Australia was invited to help in Vietnam when in actual fact it was the Australian Government who forced themselves to be included in the Vietnam war.

STill another article looks at the implications of the current bank mergers and states that by the Federal Government allowing "competition from highly aggressive, profit hungry foreign banks" will mean in the long run far less service to its customers and will increase the interest rates and decrease the availability of loans for ordinary people (while diverting its money to the so-called resources boom). It asks what is the Federal Government attempting to do by deregulising the banks?

Lastly Saturdays Herald looks again at the Hilton Hotel bombing mystery and asks the question who really did plant the bomb? The article goes on to express its opinion that they believe the Ananda Marga were framed by Australian Intelligence for the bombing. It also asks indepth who really planted the bomb and directs the reader to believe that it was really planted possibly by the Australian Intelligence organisations (but not meant to explode) to make political capital out of the incident.

It is interesting to see the Herald coming to similar conclusions as a student publication printed by the students of U.N.S.W. that was published just after the Hilton bombings. They, at the time stated that Malcolm Frazer was behind the bombings but the Herald's article does not go quite that far.

Quite some time has passed since my visit so I expect full facilities are being enjoyed by all, at this point in time - if this is the case, please accept my full apologies.



Quasar is a Brisbane-based contemporary band that is slowly gaining recognition around Australia. As is the case with most off the straight and narrow groups, Quasar lack the money and agency support to promote its activities. Often the public at large misses out on seeing and hearing the group as they flit in and out of venues without the fanfare of TV, press and radio announcements.

The current line-up is Len Henderson on guitar, Barry Tiplady on bass and Trevor Tiplady on drums.

The band is from Queensland and the music is formed of fire, pulse and passion. Drums and cymbals make positive and definitive individual statements while guitar and bass sometimes carry the rhythm and sometimes sing and growl and grunt like horns (Michael Foster, Canberra Times).

This is no New Wave band smashing out basic chords in an orgy of superficial aggression. Quasar's musical violence is real - all the more potent for being contained.



The musical direction in which Quasar is travelling is leading to exploration of themes 'closer to home' than the earlier intergalactic sojourns, though incorporating no less dynamism or energy. Some of the newer compositions convey their Australian experience, while others seek to express man's inner self.



promises promises....

"I can promise you honesty and integrity in Government", announced Liberal Party Leader Malcolm Fraser in November 1975. "I'd like to have a Government which people can trust."

Continued from last issue!

There will be no international safaris by members of Parliament. Australian does not need a tourist as Prime Minister. (November 27, 1975). In the first two-month parliamentary recess almost a quarter of a million dollars was



spent on trips by federal parliamentarians, their wives and staff. Mr Fraser's total for his first three years was 13 trips. Mr Peacock made well over 20. Mr Whitlam, who was Foreign Minister as well as Prime Minister', made 13 trips in his term of office.

The real value of pensions will be preserved. (November 27, 1975). The real value of pensions has in fact been significantly reduced. Since Fraser took office, there has been no adjustments in rent assistance, dependent child's allowance, orphans' pensions, guardian's allowances or family allowances. As a result, pensioners receiving these allowances are up to \$5 per week worse off than in 1975.

We stand by our commitment to abolish the means test on pensions. (November 27, 1975). In the 1978 Budget, an income test was re-introduced for pensioners over 70.

Urban programs will be continued. November 27, 1975). Many, such as the Area Development Program were discountunued. Others were drastically cut back. Expenditure on growth centres was cut in one year, 1976-77, from \$71.8 million to \$15 million. A Liberal-National Country Party Government will initiate a new deal for migrants. (November 27, 1975). In virtually every major area of migrant welfare there. has been a decline in allocations and a consequent run-down of services. Most severely hit have been education services, special migrant welfare services and the office of the Commissioner for Community -Relations.

We will not disrupt essential programs or programs for which contracts have been let. (November 27, 1975). Contracts cancelled during Fraser's first year of office totalled \$60 million. The 1977 Budget cancelled expenditure on the national sewerage program in every state. The water resources program was abandoned. Pipeline Authority construction, for which contracts had been let, were cut by 43.4 percent. Possibly, to Mr Fraser, these also were not essential.



We will work positively in cooperation with trade unionists. (November 27, 1975). From its handling of numerous industrial disputes, the Government appears rather to have actively confronted and provoked the trade unions. The hasty passage of the Commonwealth Employees Act and the establishment of the Industrial Relations Bureau — which gives the Government sweeping dictatorial powers over unionists — were not seen as either co-operative or positive.

We will abolish the Prices Justification Tribunal... during the first session of the new parliament. (November 27, 1975). Nine parliamentary sessions later, the PJT is still alive. Just Axed by the Razor Grang.


We shall ensure that no person is denied legal aid because of lack of means. (November 27, 1975). Despite some minor changes in 1978, the legal aid situation remains inadequate. Many pensioners and others living below the poverty line still cannot meet the stringent requirements for legal aid. From February 1st, 1978, further tax cuts will come in for every Australian wage and salary earner... The Government will bring taxes 'down further — not increase them. (November 21, 1977). For most wage and salary earners the supposed savings were taken away virtually immediately through indirect taxes' and increased health insurance payments. In the next Budget, six months later, taxes were in fact increased by a 'temporary' 1.5 percent surcharge. Taxes overall have 'steadily increased under Fraser.

From February 1st (1978), more than 225,000 low income caners will cease to pay any tax at all. (November 21, 1977). Direct income tax may have been eliminated for some, but these savings were wiped out by health insurance charges and/ or increased indirect taxes. Many were soon paying direct income tax again as wages rose in the absence of full tax indexation.

Our reforms will maintain the purchasing power of wages and ease the pressure for excessive wage demands: (November 27, 1975). Precisely the opposite has taken place. The wage demands in the Victorian power dispute and the petrol tanker drivers' dispute, to take two examples, were prompted largely by the erosion of real wages through the Government's opposition to full wage indexation.

We will ensure the standard of health care does not decline ... Particulare stress will be placed on meeting the needs of the disadvantaged including ... Aboriginal children. (November 27, 1975). The abolition of Medibank has made access to adequate health care much harder for many. The incidence of disease amongst Aboriginal



children and Aboriginal infant mortality remain appallingly high.






HOW TO AVOID PAYING \$5.00 PER SUBJECT



KEITH SWANICK

MUSIC EDUCATOR

Keith Swanick, Professor of Music Education at London University will visit Riverina Music Centre for three days in May in order to work with local music groups and to talk to private music teachers, Music Centre Staff and school teachers with a special interest in music.

Professor Swanick is a pianist, organist and brass player but is more widely known as a conductor and educator.

He has a substantial list of publications in the field of Music Education ranging from articles on the philosophy and psychology of music to books on Popular Music and, more recently, "A Basis for Music Education". He is also an examiner for a number of awards in music and music education and acts as a consultant and adviser to a number of bodies in Britain. He has lectured widely in the U.K., Canada and Brazil. His research interests are mainly in the areas of aesthetics and curriculum developments of musician schools.

Professor Swanick brings to his work considerable experience of music and music teaching in Schools and in Adult Education. -----000000------

Keith Swanick's Australian visit is promoted by the Australian Society for Music Educațion (A.S.M.E.) He will be a guest speaker at the A.S.M.E. Conference in Melbourne in May.

He is coming to Riverina Music Centre (Wagga Wagga Branch) as an Artist-in-Residence at Riverina College. All of Professor Swanick's sessions are open to the public. Teachers (of all kinds) are especially invited to attend the Thursday evening session at which he has been invited to address us on the role of music in contemporary society. Each of us, whether we work with music in the classroom or in private studios, should gain a great deal from Professor Swanick's Public Address.
