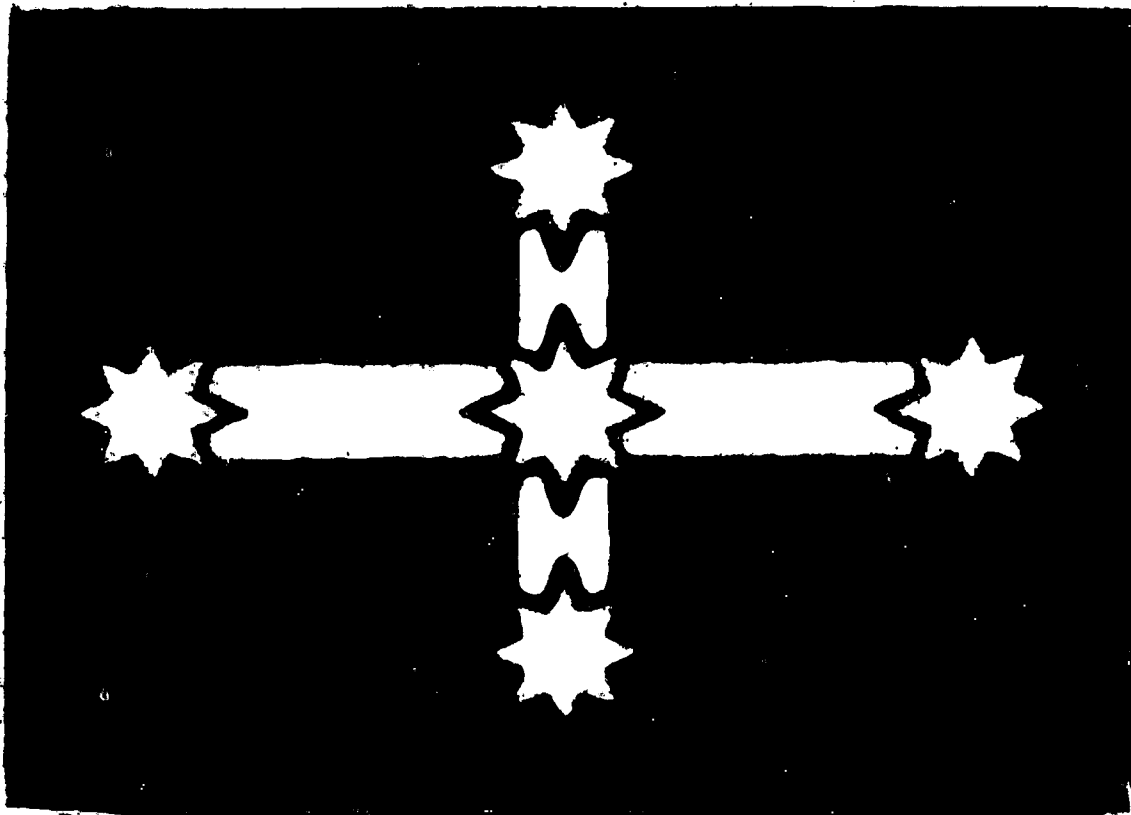

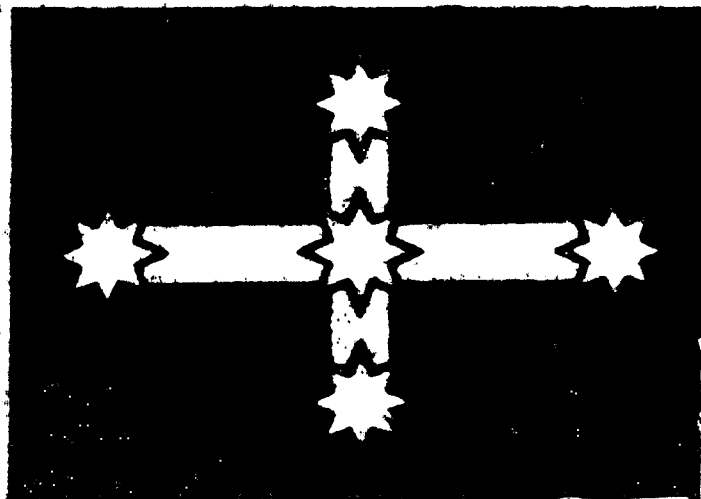

of Australia's independence.

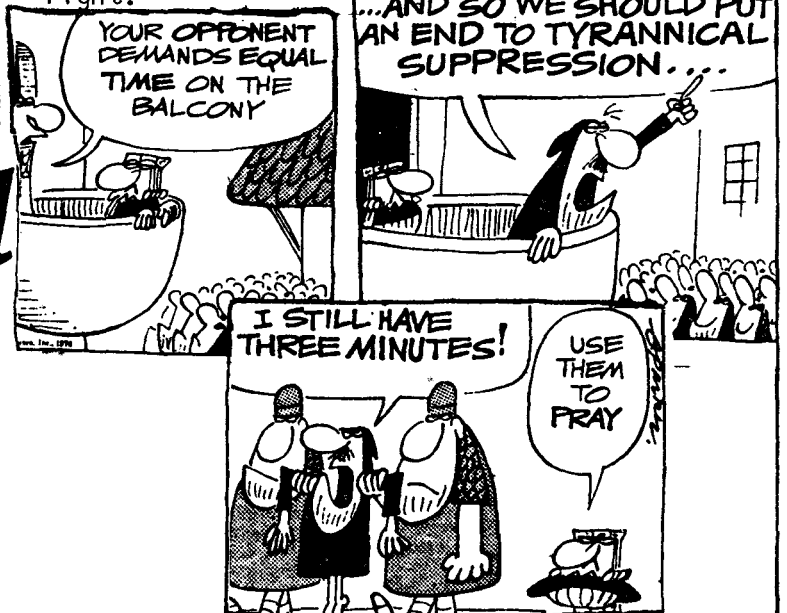


This rebel flag has been flown for

## DAY OF SHAME

November the Eleventh must rank as the most historical date in Australian history.

There have been three very significant events on this date:

- Nov 11, 1880 - Execution of Ned Kelly
- Nov 11, 1918 - Remembrance Day
- Nov 11, 1975 - Dismissal of Whitlam Government.

The sacking of the democratically-elected Whitlam Labor Government clearly overshadows the two previous events. It rates as a complete travesty of justice - an event unprecedented in the so-called Western democratic world.

The role of the Governor General (Kerr's Cur) is well known and has been documented. But the sinister role and actions of Frazer and international capital is not so public. It has been recently established that the C.I.A. had a hand (not just Nugan!) in the undermining of the Whitlam government. Frazer has been the most divisive element ever in Australian society. Indeed he is the only Prime Minister not to resign after having a vote of no confidence passed on him in the Lower House. A real democrat!

Massive demonstrations and civil protests have seemingly followed Frazer's every move.

He has broken nearly every election promise and sought to dismantle all of Whitlam's reforms - Medibank, Trade Practices, Commission Prices Justification Tribunal and now Tertiary Education.

The Frazer regime has been involved in more scandals and ministerial resignations than Whitlam's Government "hoax affairs".

Inflation is now at record levels and there are now nearly a million people out of work.

So much for the "resources boom" and an "investment-led" recovery!

There is no doubt that history will judge Gough Whitlam much more kindly than it will Frazer and his cohorts.

Applications arrive at the TEAS Office in considerable numbers during February and March. This causes a build up of applications resulting in delays in processing them for payment to students.

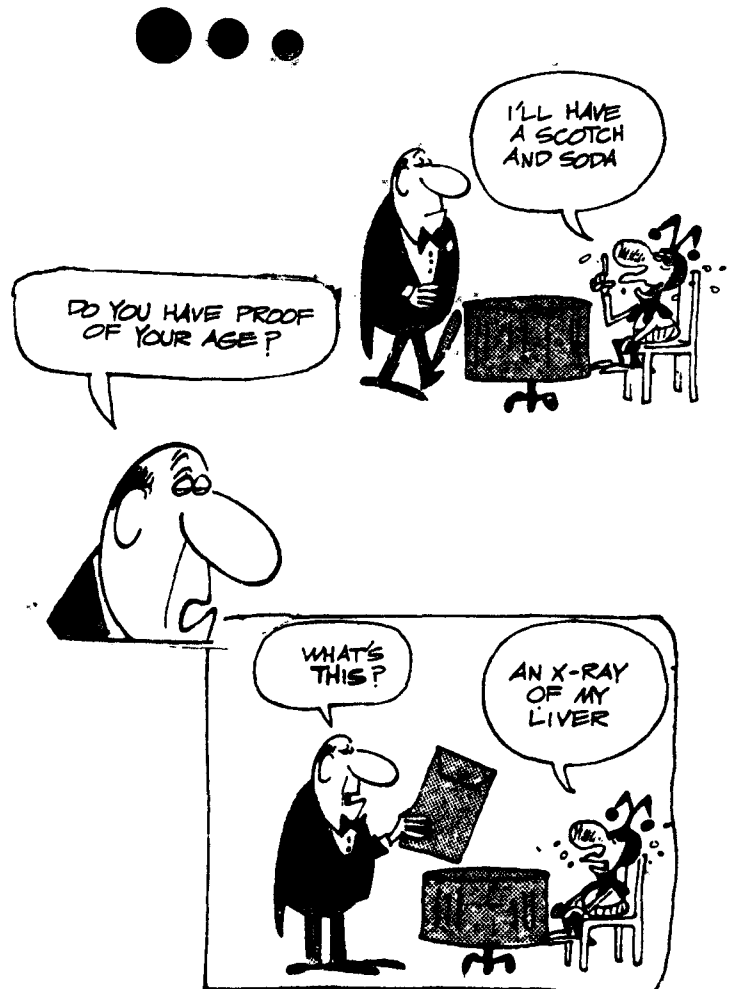

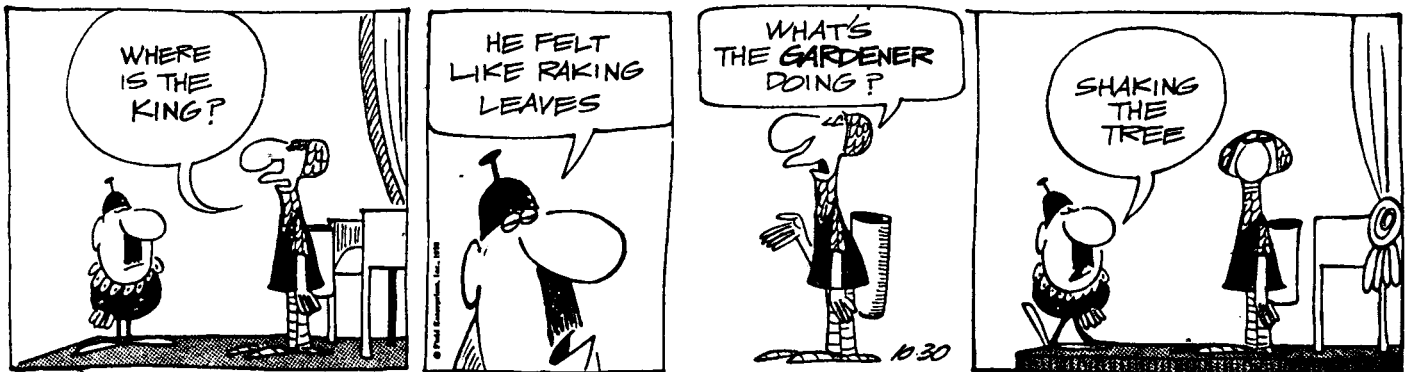
The play has recently undergone a revival in Sydney directed by Buzo himself and critics

We got a few serves and we did hit the ball a few times but they were sort of too good for us, but anyway we did our best.

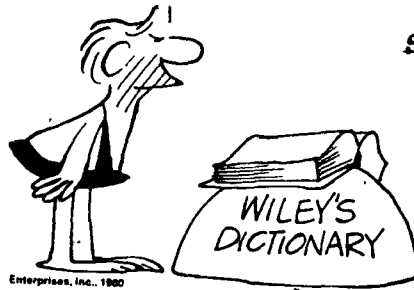
