

ment's report recommending fees was handed to The report suggests a fee of \$1,000 per annum for most courses but states that "some courses, the Prime Minister. for example medicine" will cost more, perhaps 2.000.

It will be interesting to see the stance taken by the administration on the <u>introduction</u> of Tertiary Fees. It is publically known that certain important members of College Council and the Administration strongly support the philosophical concept of fees for students.

However against their philosophical and political beliefs is the practicality of what the future holds for their College if the majority of students can't afford to pay \$1,000 a year to attend College.

It will be interesting to see which way they will turn!!!





Re: letter from P E Aiken, Serials Librarian

It is very pleasing to know that P.C. Aiken is concerned for the life and limbs of one of our disabled students. The tragedy is that it leaves a slightly sour taste in the mouth, especially, in this the Year of the Disabled.

The point that Dave cannot travel unaccompanied in the lift alone while basically sound, sounds very much like discrimination when stated that "users may panic should the lift fail". As Dave is doing Med Tech, I assume he can READ any signs that are placed there - surely it would not take up too much valuable time to place one there. Surely too, it would take only a few moments for one of our ever helpful librarians to show Dave the procedure to follow if the lift fails.

The concern about the staff area is laughable, if it weren't for the fact that P E Aiken appears to be serious. The way it is written one imagines Dave with a jet propelled wheelchair, charging out of the lift, racing through the staff area, scooping up all the goodies, and then disappearing into the sunset persued by a gaggle of female librarians in twinset and with bunned hair, waving their cateloging books and throwing cups of tea at the villain (come off it!!) I'm sure that in the case of a disabled student, strict rules can be relaxed.

After all, librarians, librarys are for the people, not for your convenience. The number of grumbles about poor service and rudeness from some library assistants can only make one believe that bricks and mortar are more important than the student users. To put a set of nit-picking objections against the use of the library in the path of a disabled student forces one to conclude that if you cant get yourself around and find your own needs, then Rivcoll Library is best avoided.





Dear Mr Cook and P Aiken (IRC)

The points are valid but if it is a peoples lift then it should have some form of communication in the lift and any person who has any brains at all would I think, be capable of using that communicating device. After all there are many many lifts throughout this country which are not manned.

I think maybe there is serious lack of communication within your administration of the IRC. Does this rule still exist or doesnt it? Please inform me and the other students because here we have two conflicting answers, both presumably from the same

Anybody who has had anything at all to do with research for assignments will know that you have to go back and forth to the library many times to find the right book with the right information in it. Also how the hell am I supposed to know what assignments I'm doing next semester. Also if I did get all the books necessary for my next few assignments not only would my bookshelves be overcrowded but I would be denying other students the use of these books. And if the library rules are adhered to, then I can expect to pay a rather large late fine by the end of the year.

Stop trying to make excuses why the lift doesn't work. The reason why it doesn't/didn't and most probably won't work is because of bad architectual planning.

There is a solution and it happens to be a very expensive solution, that is why I addressed my previous letter to the Minister of Education Mr Wal Fife.

Therefore the College is 'inter alia' using the position to their political advantage when it is implied that in some way this 'Youth Worker' is taking over the


role of the Counseller.

cannot help being a little cynical.



## -EXECUTIVE-OFFICERS-REPORT



Another graduation has passed by with all the usual traumas normally associated with such occasions. A special thank you to those people who helped out with gown hire and the Graduation dinner and ball.

Membership

One thing that did emerge during the hiring of Academic gowns was the impression that certain staff members believe that they are entitled to the use of Union facilities and services for nothing.

Staff are not automatically members of the Union. The Union resolved in 1980 that all members of the Unions Clubs must be members of the Union. Sporting and other clubs who have people participating in their activities who are not members run the risk of losing their Union subsidy and the Union's support services.

People other than students may join the Union by following a simple procedure. By completing an application for membership form and sending it together with the annual fee of \$32 to the Secretary of the Union.

The fee of \$32 is an associate membership fee and entitles the members to the use of all Union facilities and services on the same basis as a student. It does not, however, entitle the member to voting rights or the right to stand for election to the

Council of the Union.

Staff may obtain voting rights and the right to stand for election upon the payment of the same fee as that applicable to a full-time student. The membership year of the Union runs from the 1st March in one year until the last day of February in the following year.

Re-introduction of Tertiary Fees

Readers of the National Times would have noticed another selective leak of Frasers Razor gang's proposals regarding tertiary fees. It appears as though Fraser's cabinet has more leaks than the Titanic. The idea of selectively leaking information is not new, it has been used many times before in an attempt to guage public reaction to a proposal. Those amongst us who do not believe in quality of opportunity for all and who wish to see the closure of Colleges such as this one will applaud the reintroduction of tertiary fees. On the other hand, those people who subscribe to the notion that equal education opportunities should be available to all will protest loud and vigorously to their local members, to State and Federal Ministers For Education and to the Prime Minister and his cabinet.

Elections for the governing body of Rivcoll Union, ie. Rivcoll Council will be held this June.

The Council of Rivcoll Union is responsible for the running of all Union Activities - it oversees and funds all activities such as entertainment, sports, clubs, student newspapers, welfare, 'political, Child Care, Commer-basis. Except in special cial Activities (such as bar. canteens and Co-op shop) printing etc.

The Council comprises ordinary students like you! All students are eligible to stand for election together with fully financial affiliate members (eg. lecturers who have paid a membership fee equivalent to the G.S.F. \$75).

There are 20 positions to be filled in the June election - at present the Union Council is made up of 6 external students, 2 part-time students and 12 full time students.

The Union has a policy of funding External students to attend our meetings, which are held approximately every 4-5 weeks on a Friday night. Obviously the new committee can set a meeting time to suit its members. At present having student, include your policy the meetings on a Friday night allows External and Part-time students ample opportunity to either drive or fly to Wagga for the meeting.

With External Students now outnumbering the Full-time students 3 to 1, the Union looks forward to and envisages greater participation and involvement from External and Part-time students on the Union Council.

The Directors of Rivcoll Union all provide their time and energy on a voluntary circumstances. Directors cannot also

be employees of Rivcoll

Union. One such special occasion is the President's Honorarium.

Present policy states that if the President elected to take on only one subject per Semester and devoted themself full-time to the job of President then the Union would pay the President an Honorarium of up to \$3,500. As yet these conditions have not been met and the Honorarium has not been paid.

Included on this page is a nomination form for you to complete if you intend to stand for election. Complete the details as requested, have yourselves nominated by another statement, a photo of yourself and forward to:-


(If you are an External Student who is having difficulty in obtaining a person to nominate you due to isolation etc. then please contact the Union office and we shall assist you).

There was a tragic sequel to the Ball with a shocking car accident involving members of the "Fabulaires".




