EXECUTIVE OFFICERS REPORT

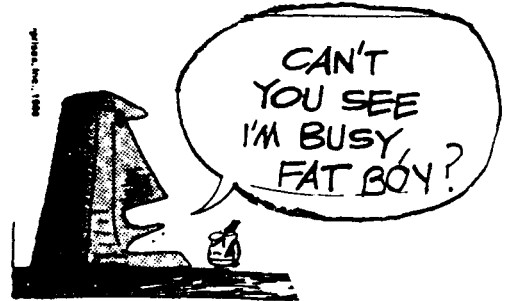
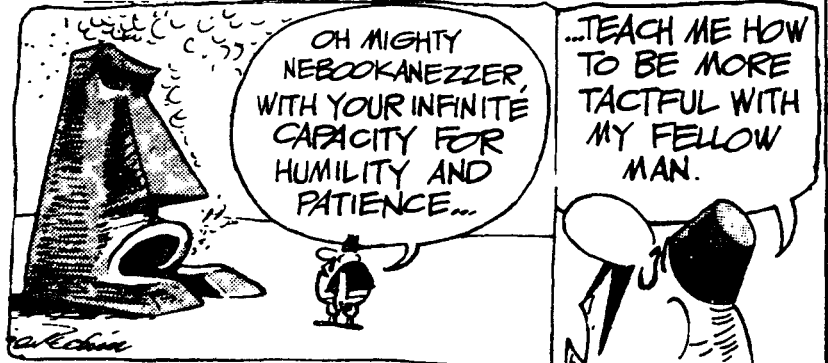
At long last the N.S.W. Government, through the Minister for Education, Mr Ron Mulock, has announced the arrangements for the amalgamation of the Riverina and Goulburn Colleges of Advanced Education.

The announcement was made in Goulburn on Friday where the Minister held discussions with the Councils of both Colleges and student representatives from Goulburn and Wagga together with other interested parties.

Perhaps of major concern are the following points:-

1. The amalgamation takes effect from 1st January, 1982.
2. The Minister has stated that the Government will "ensure that a vigorous programme of higher education continues to be offered at the Goulburn Campus".
3. Mr Mulock re-affirmed guarantees protecting employment difficulties, salary and status of the staff of both colleges, but he made it clear that staff may be required to move between the three campuses of the College.
4. Students presently studying at Goulburn will be able to complete their courses at Goulburn.
5. The Goulburn campus will become the administrative Headquarters for the External Studies programme of the College. This arrangement may have far reaching effects on the enrolment of correspondence students and could have a divisive affect of student unionism.
6. The first class residential facilities at Goulburn will enable it to develop as a major centre of in-service training for a number of State Government Departments and others.

7. There will be an additional 8 persons appointed to the existing council of Riverina College to take effect immediately. Associate Professor J Hagan together with four members of the Goulburn College Council and three members of the Albury/Wodonga advisory committee will be appointed.
8. A special committee comprising 10 persons with Goulburn interests will advise the Principal on matters relating to policy as it affects the Goulburn campus. This committee will have power to co-opt when necessary.
9. New courses available at Albury will be in the fields of Applied Arts and



- Sciences and Business Studies.
10. New courses proposed for Goulburn include: External Offerings in Park Management, Inter-cultural Communication and Adult Education as well as Educational Studies. In addition full and part-time courses will be offered in General Administration, Community Services and Psychiatric Nursing.

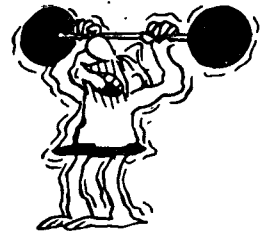
Amalgamation and Student Unionism

Closely following the Minister's announcement to proceed with the amalgamation, Rivcoll Union is examining a proposal to create a student representative body embracing all campuses of the College whose role it will be to represent all students of the College to the College Council and its sub-committees, educational authorities and others. This proposal is aimed at ensuring that each campus may determine the most appropriate structure to suit its individual needs.

Input and suggestions from interested persons will be greatly appreciated.

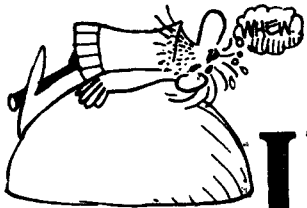

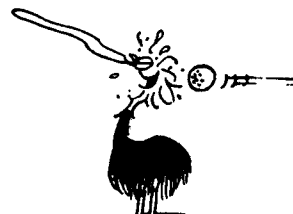

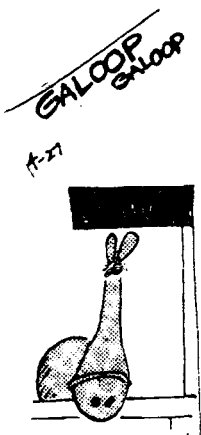

DIATRIC (G Doughty): Friend of Phill Rava's owns this one so more than likely it will run last.

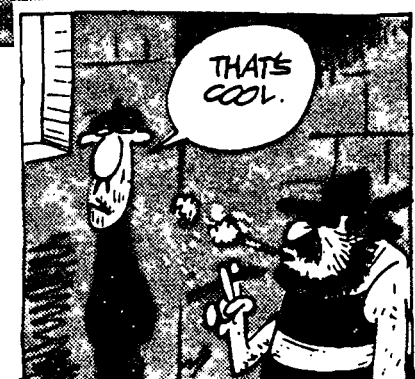
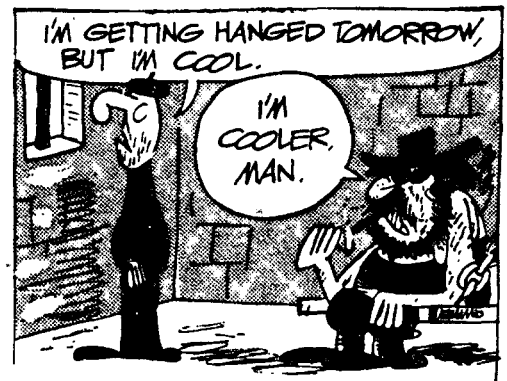
FAVOLOSO: (M Riles). Old stayer who should be run off his legs.

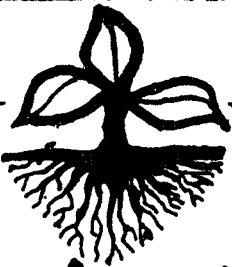
The Union must be left in the same state as it was prior to the function - all decorations equipment etc. must be removed and the premises cleaned by 10.30am the day after the function - including weekends.

Cool, calm and disconnected

Last year, four million prescriptions for tranquilisers were issued in Australia, mostly for Valium. In the US, sales of Valium amounted to \$400 million with more than 20 million people using the drug. It is estimated that 10 percent of adult Australians regularly use tranquilisers (usually Valium) and that 12,000 of last year's prescriptions for Valium syrup were designed to keep children quiet. Valium is the

single most prescribed drug in Australia despite growing concern about over-use and possible cancer-causing properties.

A HEC of a state

Tasmania's recent state budget confirms the massive drain that the Hydro Electric Commission (HEC) is imposing on the state's welfare and social services. The HEC now accounts for 52% of all Tasmania's capital works with housing and construction on 7% each, health on 5%, and education and other welfare services on 7% each. Despite large federal budget cuts, the Tasmanian government has maintained a huge financial commitment to the HEC schemes, cutting welfare services instead, and putting even greater financial and social burdens on the people of Tasmania.

Cancer compo

Former asbestos workers at the Raybestos-Manhattan plant in the US will share a \$9.4 million compensation fund. The agreed settlement is expected to provide a precedent for similar cases throughout the USA. The plant closed in 1973 but some of the diseases contracted from the substances used in the plant do not show up for years. It is not yet known how the fund is to be divided between the 680 workers but it will probably involve a scale based on exposure to dangerous materials and severity of the disease. In Australia, the asbestos lobby last week declared that it was "impossible" to increase the impact of the warnings about asbestos contained in warning stickers on asbestos products, and have strenuously fought any and every case seeking

health damages against asbestos companies.

Toxic water

The French government will campaign to limit the use of nitrogen-based fertilisers. The fertilisers have polluted France's underground water resources, an important source of drinking water. The government campaign will include bans on certain fertilisers in badly polluted areas and extensive education programs to make farmers more aware of the dangers of over-use. In some areas, underground water is already so polluted with nitrates that its use has been banned.

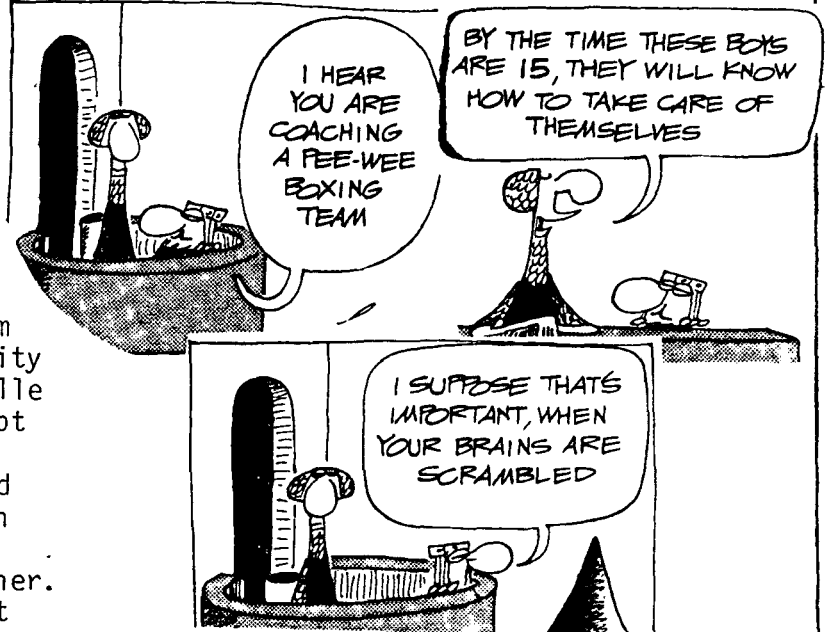

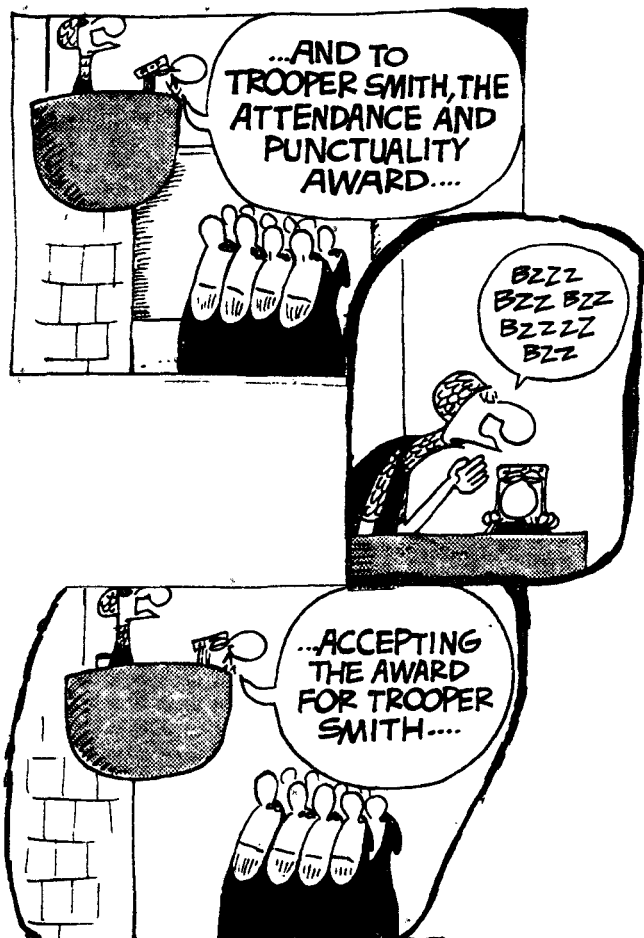
