Setting into community radio is getting out of the doldrums

COMMUNITY RADIO IS FOR EVERYBODY

Students of Rivcoll - indeed students everywhere - should not be denied the right to participate in a community resource, as essential and powerful, as the broadcast media (epitomised in this case by Community Radio).

Tertiary students are students for a mere 4 - 5 years. They are one of the most valuable sectors of society. They must be permitted the privileges and rights allowed to all society members. There is no justification for them being deprived of participating in the decision-making processes of Community Radio.

It is the considered belief of the Rivcoll S.R.C. FM Radio Sub-Committee, that the Wagga and district community can be best served by the establishment of a Public Broadcasting Station operating a Class 'C' Community Radio Licence. In addition, it is maintained that the greatest benefit can be derived from this Community Radio Station, if it is owned and controlled by the citizens of the community that use it and listen to it.

This involvement in community radio should not be withdrawn when students are no longer actively involved with the College.

So it is, that the new Community Radio Station, must be community based. Our understanding of this, does not exclude one section or another. It embraces people of all classes and backgrounds. Professionals, academics, students, administrators, the skilled and unskilled, special interest groups, educational organisations, welfare bodies, and so onare all part of the mass audience at sometime and all part of minority audiences at other times. The Minister for Posts and Telecommunications, Tony Staley, has stated that Community Radio is called to include all these.
