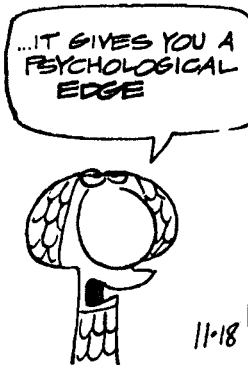
Mr A McKelvie, a former full-time student of the College has now committed \$100 towards the needy student loan fund providing the College Council refuses to collect tertiary tuition fees.

Halloween is a combination of celebrations from Ancient and Medieval times.

Halloween in Medieval times, was 'All Hallows Eve' observed on October 31st, the eve of 'All Saints Day'.

On the same day in ancient Britain and Ireland, the Druids had an autumn festival called 'Samhain' or summers end. It was an ancient fire festival, when huge bonfires were set on hill tops to frighten away evil spirits. The date was connected with the return of herds from pasture, and laws and land tenures were renewed. The soul of the dead were supposed to revisit their homes on the day, and the autumn festival acquired sinister significance with ghosts, witches hobgoblins, black cats, fairies and demons of all kinds said to be roaming around. The Druids believed cats to be sacred, having once been human beings, but changed into cats for doing evil deeds. It was the time to appease the super natural powers which controlled the processes of nature. In addition Halloween was thought to be the most favourable time for foretelling luck, health, marriage and death. It was the only day the devil was evoked for such purposes.

These pagen customs influenced the.

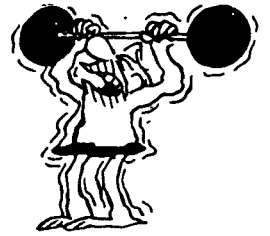
Christian festival of 'All Hallows Eve'. Gradually Halloween became a secular celebration, and many customs and practices developed.

In Europe young children go from house to house on this day often in costume, daring trick or treat, the treat is usually sweets but the trick is rarely played. Bobbing for apples is a popular Halloween game. A traditional symbol is the jack o Lantern, a hollowed out pumpkin carved with an evil face and with a lighted candle inside.

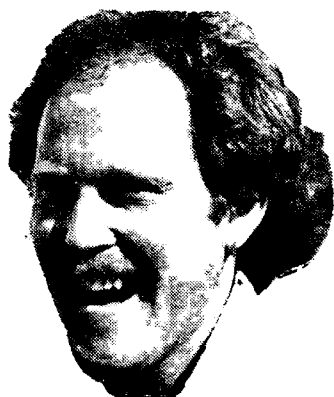

Club Budgets

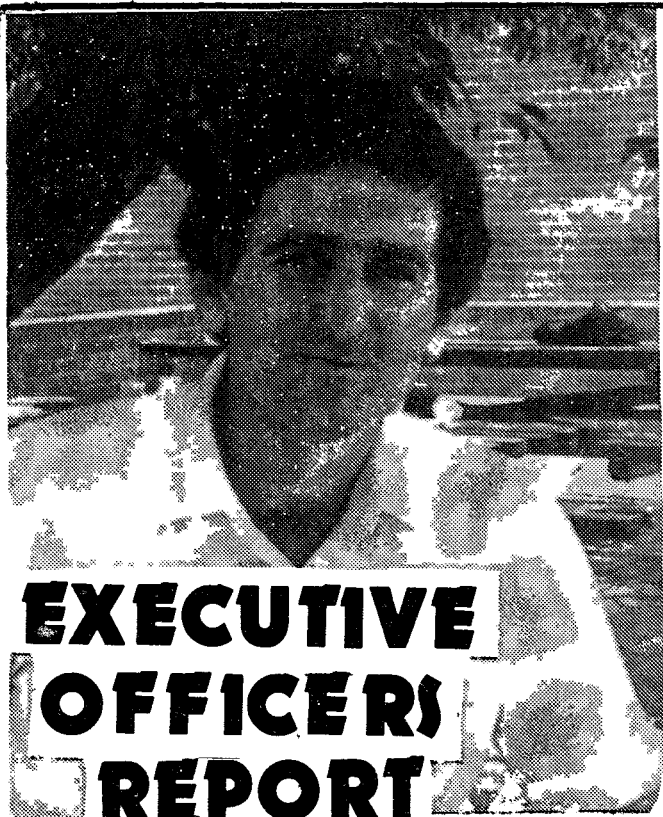

EXECUTIVE OFFICERS REPORT

Union Affiliated Clubs

It is becoming apparent that many Union affiliated and funded clubs are not abiding by the conditions for affiliation.

Some of the conditions which are not being adhered to are:

1. All clubs must deposit monies generated with the Union cashier within two working days of the receipt of such monies.
2. Clubs are not to maintain separate bank accounts, however named.
3. Clubs are not to incur expenses either within or outside the Union without first obtaining an official order form from the Union.

The above conditions of affiliation are in no way designed to hinder the Club in its activities but rather are designed to protect the members of the Club and of the Union against instances of misappropriation of funds. It takes only a few minutes to obtain a purchase order or to deposit money. Clubs which continue to violate the terms and conditions of affiliation and funding will have their funding withdrawn.

Union Membership

Because Union affiliated clubs and societies obtain substantial subsidies from the Union it is reasonable to expect that all persons participating in Union Club activities will be members of the Union. Clubs who are playing persons who are not paying members of the Union run a risk of losing their subsidy.

It has also become obvious that indoor cricket and other activities are taking place in the Union over the weekend. Common sense should dictate that the Union Auditorium is not a suitable place for such activities.

Cliff of the Inland.

The College are showing a marked reluctance to making a public stand on the issue of fees, loans and other measures being implemented by the Federal Government. It appears that Riverina College will live up to its reputation in tertiary education circles - that it does not wish to take a stand on anything other than its own survival.

A Goulburn Amalgamation?

The new Minister for Education in N.S.W. Mr. Mullock still has not made a decision concerning the amalgamation of Riverina and Goulburn Colleges.

It therefore seems that the action taken by the Administration of Riverina College in goose-stepping into the Finance and Personnel records of the Goulburn College is not only pre-empting a decision by the Minister but also prejudicing that decision.

Fees, TEAS and Loans

AUS (Australian Union of Students) have prepared and presented a comprehensive and well researched submission to the Minister for Education, Wal Fife. This submission contains some excellent material that is available to all interested persons at the Union office. This submission is worth \$2.50 from each student, the AUS Annual membership fee, on its own and demonstrates the value of a national student Union.

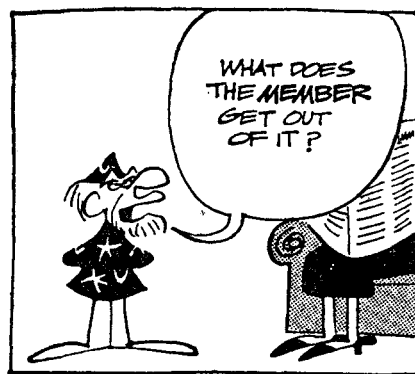
It is really disgusting how selfish some of our fellow students can be.

SWISS GOVERNMENT SCHOLARSHIP 1982/83

The Swiss Federal Authorities are offering a scholarship to an Australian student for study in Switzerland.

The scholarship is intended for either a postgraduate student or a student who is well advanced in his course and for whom a period in Switzerland would serve as a complementary education.

Applicants need to be Australian citizens and not over the age of 35 years.

Benefits include a living allowance, exemption from university fees and an air fare from Switzerland to Australia upon conclusion of the course.

The scholarship is tenable for one or two years from October, 1982.

Courses are given in French or German so candidates need to have a knowledge of either of these languages. It may be possible for the scholarship to be extended to include a three months preparatory language course in Fribourg.

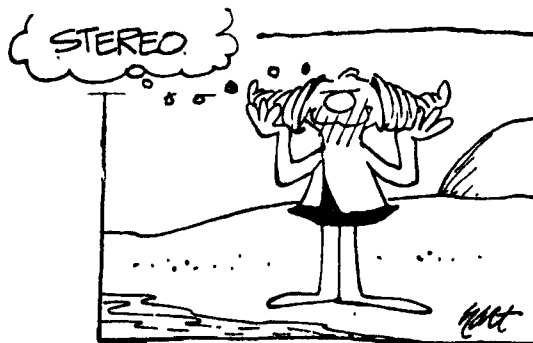
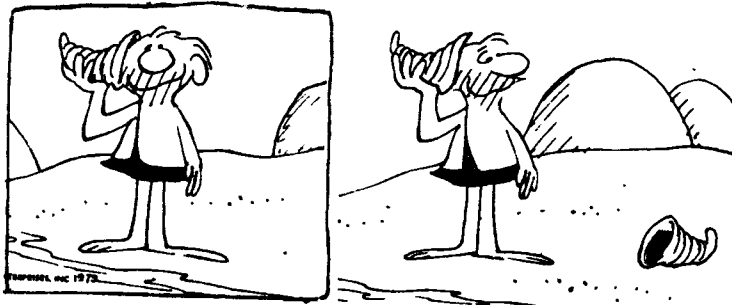
RUGBYETTES

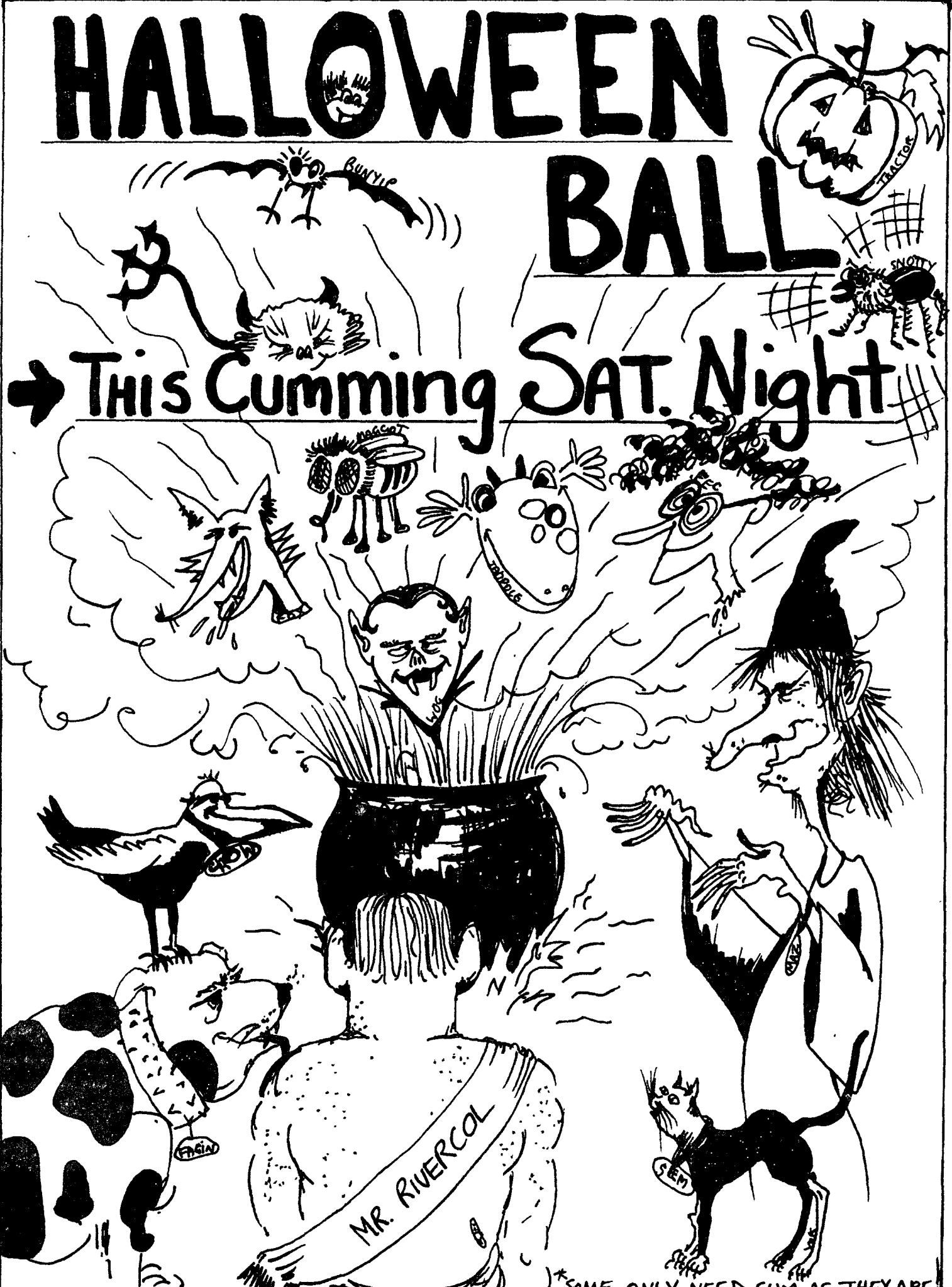
