When a Director has a show which flops he hasn't the slightest right to start ranting like a spoilt child and abusing people for not going to see his show.

Students who work in your shows are sick of your constant jibes - "The Trucking Co. would do it this way" - (gross stupid parody) - "So we will do it THIS way".

And, how dare you infer in your column that "Rocky Horror" will be a success only because people know the songs. If it is a success it will be because it deserves to be, because it is good, like most Trucking Co. productions, not a half-baked high-school camp show like "Forum" was.

To Barph,

This article is in response to two articles which appear in this week's Barph.

To begin with, I would ask that any complaints regarding the services provided by the U.B.M. be directed to the U.B.M., and not put in Barph, as this prevents the U.B.M. from a right of reply.

(1) If someone has a complaint then please get the facts straight. The U.B.M. has endeavoured not to increase sandwich prices from when the College had the Canteen last year, a fact which is incredible when you consider how costs have increased for bread, fillings and labour, which have all had price rises in that time.

As to the accusation that the Canteen uses stale bread. I would like to invite the author into the Canteen at the end of a day to find any bread which is, supposedly, left over and not in sandwich form. All left over sandwiches are taken to the Bar when the Canteen closes and anything left from there is thrown out.

Since the Canteen now gives work to some 9 students, on a casual basis, do you really think that the students would deliberately make sandwiches which would rip-off their fellow students. I cannot understand why the U.B.M. is not flooded with complaints about the Canteen if your accusations are correct, but as there has been no other complaint, I can only conclude that the quality of service is a lot better than you are trying to make out.

The policy for running the Canteen is that it is to cover costs but not make a substantial profit. So far this has been the case and we are in no way ripping students off as the prices are well below those in town for sandwiches.

(2) The U.B.M. does not condone riotous behaviour in the Union. I would like to remind the "anonymous person" who wrote this article, that the U.B.M. members and other volunteers spend many hours/week giving valuable assistance to the Bar. If damage is done the person/s responsible will be fined. As there has been no damage done, reported or found, then there is not any need for a fine. Also the definition of riotous behaviour varies from person to person; so I can only repeat my request that complaints be directed to the U.B.M. firstly, rather than an anonymous letter in Barph.
