
The hitch-hiking stickers - now available in Amenities Office - are for:-


- (1) People who hitch-hike


ACOUSTIC CLUB

The Child Care Centre is open every College day beteen the hours of 9.00 a.m. and 6.00 p.m. - vacancies exist at all times.

We need new ideas and original ways to raise money. Initially we expect teething problems but with help from everyone it can be a success and a tremendous boon to everyone at R.C.A.E.

For this to become a reality we need assistance from both staff and students. We need to improve the physical aspects - floor

coverings, curtains, domestic and play equipment, paintings etc. to provide a homely stimulating environment.

We are planning a structured program so that the centre will provide not only child minding facilities but an environment encouraging social, physical and cognitive growth in the children in our care.

We intend registering the centre next year and plan to work under 'Home Group Care' with guidance from Harvey Wilson (Youth, Ethnic and Community Services). Once this has been established we can apply for Government funds from a number of different sources.

This will, among other things, provide us with a grant to pay a trained full-time assistant, who can provide the security of continual contact, so necessary to a child.

The Centre can also provide College students and staff with facilities close by where observation of and interaction with children is possible.

Editor's Note on Medibank -

Bex is actually confusing the issue further. Students don't have to do ANYTHING about Medibank. About 25¢ per week will be deducted for the Medibank levy - and this will only be deducted in case you have an extra job and wind up earning lots of money over the year. In normal events - IT WILL BE REFUNDED in your tax refund. I.E. - single people who earn less than \$2,605 (\$50 p.w.) and married people who earn less than \$4,300 PAY NOTHING FOR BASIC MEDIBANK. Even if you do mean to earn extra money - up to \$5,000 per year - it is definitely cheaper for you to stay in Medibank - so don't do anything! (Except check out what insurance you need over and above basic Medibank!)

AUS HEALTH INSURANCE

David Purchase - S.R.C.'s AUS ADVISER - will be in the Amenities Office on Tuesdays between 2-5 to advise on AUS matters, particularly Health Cover. The AUS Health scheme closes this Thursday - i.e. applications must be in the mail by Thursday.

SO remember, you are automatically covered for basic Medibank (85% of doctor's bill - or if he bulk-bills, like Dr. Osmond - all of your doctor's bill, plus public hospital cover, without the choice of your own doctor). The AUS extra cover costs \$11 for six months and gives you intermediate hospital cover and the right to choose your own doctor when in hospital. Forms in office.

WHY VOTE FOR A NATIONAL STUDENT STRIKE ON THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 30?

As students, we of course, keep a critical eye on the developments in the society around us. But the first responsibility of the national students union must be to protect the basic economic needs of our own 250,000 members.

We support those students from a number of different campuses calling for the first national Australian student strike, because we honestly believe every other available method to represent students' need has been tried.

AUS Has participated in a Federal Government survey on students' income and expenditure, proving the need is real, to no avail.

AUS has co-operated fully with the Williams Committee, which 15 months ago recommended an \$11 rise and immediate indexation of TEAS, to no avail.

AUS has organised two national education petitions to the Federal Government, to no avail.

AUS has organised student lobbying delegations to Canberra, as well as numerous meetings of student union officials with Senator Carrick this year, to no avail.

AUS has organized pre-Budget rallies in every capital city and Country centres, to no avail.

Now the Government has announced a further committee of enquiry into student financial needs, to publish its findings early October.

This Committee will accept nostudent representation at all.

Its terms of reference are completely pre-empted from the beginning of a budget allocation which is a 12% real reduction.

The Government has delayed the printing of TEAS application forms and is making major changes to eligibility provisions for allowances.

TEAS APPLICATIONS FOR 1977

In his Budget Speech of August 17 the Treasurer, Mr. P. Lynch, announced that the Government had appointed a committee to review the Tertiary Education Assistance Scheme and other schemes of student assistance. It is unlikely that the Government will be able to announce its decisions based on the review before <u>late</u> October.

THE USUAL CLOSING DATE FOR THE LODGING OF APPLICATIONS FOR TEAS ASSISTANCE (END-OF-OCTOBER) WILL THEREFORE NOT APPLY THIS YEAR.

It is expected that application forms for assistance in 1977 will become available in December/January and supplies will be forwarded to institutions. Students who are receiving TEAS benefits in 1976 and who may be eligible for assistance in 1977, will receive an application form in the mail. The address used will be that of the last pay cheque and students who have been receiving their cheques at a term address will have to make arrangements for the form to be forwarded on to them at their home or vacation address.

Application by students in tertiary or post-secondary study in 1976 will need to be made as soon as the results of the applicant's examination are known and his course and subjects for 1977 are decided. Students will have to provide details of their examination results and 1977 study program on their application forms.

It will NOT be possible to accept applications which do not contain 1976 examination results, or, for a student beginning a course in 1977, final enrolment details. The importance of students applying IMMEDIATELY these details are known so that payments can begin as early as possible in the new academic year cannot be stressed too strongly.
