2. For Primary Teachers Seeking Employment in VICTORIA. Primary Teachers Registration Board, 49-51 Spring Street, Melbourne 3000. Please complete the Primary Teachers Registration Board application form fully, including the statutory declaration. Attach original documents or certified evidence of your qualifications securely to the application form. Original documents will be photocopied and returned by certified mail. If a diploma has not been issued by the College, please do not forward result sheets unless they specify that you have qualified for the award of the diploma. In the absence of a diploma or acceptable results sheets, please obtain from the college a statement that you have qualified for the award of the diploma. The application form will be returned to you unless acceptable evidences of qualifications is attached. Forward the completed form to the Primary Teachers Registration Board at the above address as soon as possible. Do not send the form to the Education Department. If your completed application form is received at the office of the Board by the 31st December, 1979, it will be considered at the first meeting of the Board in January, 1980 and a letter of registration will be forwarded to you in due course. Where possible give a permanent address to which your registration letter may be sent and notify the Board promptly of any change of address. You will need this letter as evidence of registration when seeking employment. If you are being married in the future, please show both your maiden name and intended married name on the application form.
PLEASE NOTE THAT YOU WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE FOR EMPLOYMENT UNLESS YOU ARE REGISTERED WITH THE PRIMARY TEACHERS REGISTRATION BOARD. Forms available from Placement Office.

THE MANAGER'S COLUMN

1. General Meeting

Last Thursday saw the General Student Meeting endorse the referendum result to dissolve the Union, the Sports Union and the S.R.C.. A new constitution was approved at that meeting which will now be re-typed and printed incorporating any amendments passed at the General Meeting. The new constitution will then be sent to College Council for endorsement - viva Rivcoll Union Limited.

It was interesting to see certain administration staff from the College and Council representatives taking a greater interest in this issue than was evident at the Sports Forum - I will refrain from any further comment.

2. Sports Fields

Whilst on the issue of sporting amenities keep your eye out for RACE, where the issues will be summarised and the student proposal restated.

3. Student Services

The proposed new Division of Student and Community Services has sparked a lot of comment over the past week. It would appear as though many of the proposals recommended by the Community Affairs Committee to the Council following recommendations from the Principal are not meeting with a wholly receptive audience. Perhaps it would be an opportune time to get all the people together who are involved and find out what they think!

4. A Boorooma Union

With the opening of the new library on Boorooma Campus the Rivcoll Union should be looking to provide a much improved service on that side of the hill. What about locating student services, student enrolments and the Rivcoll Union on Boorooma Campus. This suggestion was made recently and greeted with open displays of horror. Why? Because it would mean the moving of transportable buildings onto Boorooma, spoiling the effect of the brick veneer and tile conglomeration in existence already. Apparently buildings come before people in the eyes of many.

The split campus is causing many problems especially with the opening of the library in 1980. Unfortunately these problems will not simply go away, but will magnify in the years ahead. Now is the time to act if students are not to be seriously disadvantaged by a lack of facilities.

College staff are meeting on Wednesday November 14 at 1:00 p.m. in the Swan Theatre to discuss the formation of a staff club. Perhaps the time is opportune for the students and staff at Rivcoll to get together and plan a facility for the total College community.
