## Execufive

Shotgun Wedding?
Most people associated with Riverina College would have realised that there has been a lot of talk about amalgamation with Goulburn College and it could be "fairly said that the attitude of most people associated with Riverina College has been one of protecting their own self interests.

Following discussions with council members from both Colleges I have formed the opinion that neither side is being given all the relevant information. Riverina College, and particularly the academic staff are being led to believe that their interests will be protected. The general staff of the College and the student body has been led to believe nothing simply bacause they have been told nothing. Both groups are apparently of little consequence. On the other hand Goulburn College is being deceived into believing that their College will retain pre-service teacher education and that all staff at Goulburn would have job security.

The whole amalgamation saga has been a sordid and objectionable business from the outset. Both state and federal governments have wanted to absolve themselves of the responsibility of making a decision. Much to their delight one Clifford Douglas Blake emerged with a proposal that let them both off the hook. The teachers federation representing academic staff at Goulburn and the federation of the Academic staff associations representing the academic staff at Riverina have been too busy protecting
their own interests to bother with triviolities like getting the Councils of the Colleges together so that each College knows. exactly where they stand. To make matters worse Riverina. College Council members have been actively discouraged from discussing the amalgamation with their opposite numbers from Goulburn. The Principal is apparently going to bargain "from a position of strength", What this really means is that Cliff will wade into Goulburn with the knives sharpened and after the holocaust, when the blood and quts has been washed from the floors he will then hold "meaningful discussions".

The Council of Goulburn College have expressed an active interest in meeting with their counterparts from the Riverina. Perhaps the Council of Riverina College are not prepared to meet with the Council of Goulburn College because individual Council numbers may be afraid that they have much in common and therefore might adopt a sympathetic and even-handed attitude. One thing is certain - if the present situation continues there are going to be a lot of people seriously disadvantaged and a lot of others with a lot of egg on their faces.

AN "OPEN DAY" LETTER
Hi,
This will be my final letter to you, as - Open Day is almost upon us. I've been told that a number of schools in other towns are sending groups of students for the day and in talking to people in Wagga, Albury and Griffith, there seems to be good interest in our first attempt at showing. the community something of life and work in the College.
Between now and April 4, you can do two things to aid us. Firstly, help our publicity along by reminding your friends and relatives to come along and, secondly, pray for a fine day! Even if the drought breaks and it does rain, most of our activities are under cover, but we would prefer a bit of sunshine.'

We have some odd pieces of infomation that you might like to know about the organisation of the day.
Visitors arriving at the various entrances to the College will be given a package which will contain a campus map, a programme, and a guide to the farm area. There will be three information booths on Boorooma Campus and another on Agriculture Campus. These will be marked by big cluster of balloons flying overhead. Between the information package and the booths, we expect most people to be able to find the places that interest them.
We're asking staff and senior students to wear a label on Open Day. It says "ASK ME" The intention is that visitors can use the labels to identify people who can guide them to particular exhibits. I'm sure you will all cope with those who put a different connotation on it! Greg Keegan will be arranging to distribute these to the various Union Clubs, and those people working on displays and activities organised by the College Schools or Centres will be able to collect them from that staff there.
A Central Control point will be set up in the Information and Promotion building on the corner of Kunama Way and Cowabbie Drive. Somebody from the Organising Committee will always be in attendance there. You can reach them through any of these numbers: 376381228379
There will be public address systems on the Boorooma and Aggricul turre Camplises": These have 1 imi ted range and won't be used except for important messages. Requests for use of these should be made through the Central these
control.

An ambulance will be on stanby at the Doctor's surgery in Doman Block from 10.00 a.m. to 5.00 p .m. (phone 242).

- Police will be in attendance in mobile units throughout the day, and can be called by contacting any of the above Central Control phone numbers.
Thanks to some of the Union Clubs, cheap food will be available throughout the day. There will be mobile vans at the Winery, Boorooma Campus, Agriculture Campus, and College Farm. These serve soft drinds, ice cream, hot dogs, etc, and proceeds go back to the Clubs who are manning them. Chicken-in-a-basket and single bottles of the college wine can be purchased from the hot food bar in the Union.
If you are going to be at the College for more than a couple of hours, will you please use the more out-of-the-way parking spots, and leave the main car parks for visitors? Don't forget that the Agricultural Research Institute and Regional Veterinary Laboratory will also have sections open. Pugsley Place (in front of Graham Building) will be closed to parking on the day and the gates locked.
Your family or friends might like to come out by bus. Fearnes is running a service leaving South Campus at 25 minutes past each hour, from $9.25 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. to $3.25 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. Return trip will be on the hour from the Gymasium. The service is free to passengers and will follow the College bus route. Our own bus will be circulating within the College and down as far as the dairy, and is also free.
Already Open Day has proved its value. Preparing for it has forced a reappraisal of what we're doing, and stimulated an interest in what others are doing. To help this internal communication along, we're hoping that all those who have worked so hard in. preparing, and those who will be working with us on Open Day, will be able to join us for a drink, and a sharing of the day's experiences. The function will be held on the lawns behind Central Administration (old White House) starting about 5.00 pm It's free to workers, but if you have visitors with you, bring them along too, plus a few cans to supplement the ration. MEMO TO: All Users of the Ag Campus Pavilion

FROM: The Bursar
Following recent disgusting and unacceptable behaviour in the use of the pavilion, I write to advise that in future it will be necessary for users to obtain my approval for uses other than those which are accepted as a normal function of the building. I accept that normal functions of the building include table tennis, storage of equipment, and its use as change rooms associated with sporting activities. Other uses, particularly parties of any type, will specifically require my prior approval. In providing that approval I will require a responsible person from the group concerned to sign an "Agreement to Hire".

In the case of College based groups, there will be no hire fee applicable, but hire will be effected in accordance with terms and conditions which will be listed in the Agreement. Should damage to the
building or uncleanliness in its use then incur the College in additional work or cost, such charge will be referred back to the hirer for payment in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Agreement. In the hiring of the pavilion I will be including as part thereof the fencing and other surrounds, which themselves are often interfered with as a result of the use of the pavilion.

I am concerned that the continued use of the pavilion according to current practice will quickly bring it to the point of becoming irreparable, and if this happens, a very functional building will be lost to the college. The above measure are therefore designed to preserve the building for future use, and in those cases where it is damaged in other than conditions of fair wear and tear, the user will be required to pay the cost of repairs in addition to whatever other penalties might be applicable under the By-laws.

Your March 22nd BARPH speaks of the Academic Staff Association as "the latest group" to state opposition to amalgamation; RACE also suggests that our opposition came placidly floating in on the later tides. These suggestions fit in with the stereotype of academics as a ponderous and slow moving bunch of fuddy-duddies. Which aint necessarily so; and so let us put the record straight.

The Landa press-release which was our first authoritative information came our on a Thursday and was read on. Friday. The Staff Assocaition Executive met on the Monday, and, that week, sent telegrams expressing an outline of our fears to Landa, the H.E.B., and the State Trades and Labour Council; we also mobilized our Federal body, the F.C.A.. We wrote out our concerns at great length, and trotted down on a deputation to the H.E.B. before the year was out. Later, we attended meetings at Goulburn, mobilized our State body, local politicians, and sought an. interview with Landa. In short, were very active in stopping anything hasty being done.

The only things that came late were these: 1. getting a general meeting of members which could not be organized to endorse our actions on their behalf until the break was over and 2. students coming back and finding out what was heppening.

In fact the Staff Association has made most of the running from the R.C.A.E. end on this matter. To give him credit, the Principal has kept us fully informed and has kept close consultation with us since the December bombshell; whatever he may inadvertantly have done in fusing the bomb, we have no criticism of his actions after it fell. But we have still been. the body making the running, and we have run like rabbits on heat.
Since politicians cannot readily retreat we always knew in our hearts that the Amalgamation/merger (Amalgamander) would now have to happen womehow. We continue to run just as hard and fast to prevent its being a disaster. We academics are NOT necessarily slow-moving fuddy-duddies at all, when we have authority to do anything but waffle and we trust that the decision-making structure of the new Hume Highway Campus will reflect recognition of this fact.

## A FORTHCOMING BROKEN PROMISE ON TERTIARY FEES

The failure of the Education Minister, Mr Fife, to repeat his pre-election assurance not to re-introduce tertiary fees is the clearest indication yet that fees will be back for 1982.

On 8th October, 1980 Mr Fife said in a prepared statement "There continues to be speculation abput Government plans to re-introduce fees for tertiary education. I have given an assưrance publicly and I repeat that assurance, that no-proposals are being considered by the Government for the possible re-introduction of tertiary fees."

Today's statement suggests the latest piece of election back-sliding by this Government. Mr Fife says that the question of fees is a matter for annual consideration. Apparently this undertaking is like failed liberal politicians - subject to regular re-cycling. The Prime Minister indicated recently in Perth and Adelaide during the By-election campaign that he favoured the re-introduction of fees. Since then he has received a report recommending that fees be introduced in 1982 at a level of $\$ 2,000$ for Medicine and Law and $\$ 1,000$ for all other under-graduate courșes. It bas taken just six years for the progressive action of the Labor Government to abolish fees to be turned on its head by a Government intent on reserving universities and TAEs for the children of the rich.

While it is true that the abolition of fees did not on its own greatly improve access to tertiary education, their reimposition can do nothing but make.it even more difficult for students from average families, as well as many mature age students, to commence or continue tertiary education.
