TEAS applicants appear to have gone into hiding - at least temporarily.

And those who have gone into hiding are those continuing their courses.

Applicants for TEAS (Tertiary Education Assistance Scheme) also appear to have forgotten that the Government has introduced a formal cut-off date of March 31 for applications, making it essential for students to apply early if they are to be paid for the whole year. TEAS benefits are not retrospective after the closing date.

The Commonwealth Department of Education's TEAS assessment sections hit a slow spot in January and the number of applications was more than 10,000 down on last year's comparable figure at mid-month.

The Department's offices in the State capitals and the Australian Capital Territory had received a total of approximately 23,000 applications by the middle of January compared with nearly 35,000 at the same time last year.

Of those received by then for this year, just over half - 12,761 - had been put on pay for TEAS. This was in fact 150 more than at the same time last year when 12,605 applicants had been assessed as eligible for some benefit.

While the official closing date for applicants to receive a full year's benefit is March 31 continuing students are expected to submit an early application once they have their examination results. This is of obvious benefit to the students because it means the application will arrive when processing is quick and the first payment is not delayed.

Additionally, while the number of applications was well down on last year's and processing ahead of schedule, payments were being made speedily.

"We're expecting about 150,000 students to apply this year so there's a long way to go", a Department spokesman said.

"We are looking particularly for continuing students.

"Because new students have to wait until they enrol it is expected they would apply later than continuing students.

"There could be a bottleneck of applications during March and April when the new students start submitting their applications so the wise thing for continuing students is to make sure they get their applications in as soon as possible.

"Last year things went fairly well.

"However, with the introduction of the March 31 closing date it promises to be a little hectic towards the end of March.

"A saving feature is the use this year in our State Offices of new high speed printers to produce student assessment notices or notices advising students that they are ineligible.

"These will make processing a lot faster.

"Our publicity this year has emphasised the March 31 closing date.

"The best advice I can give students is to get their application in as soon as they can.

"Don't be caught out! "

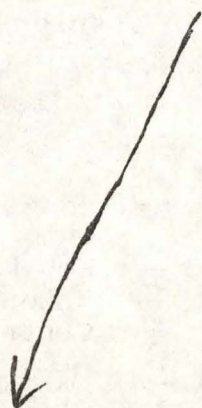
