### TERTIARY ART EDUCATION STUDY - VISUAL ARTS

An independent Committee has been established by the Visual Arts Board of the Australia Council to review and report on tertiary art education in Australia. Members of the Committee have been drawn from art institutions throughout Australia under the chairmanship of Mr. Geoff Parr, Tasmanian School of Art, Hobart. For the first time a national study is being undertaken by persons directly and professionally involved with the visual arts and with art education.

The study will be primarily concerned with tertiary education in the field of the visual arts (training for artists) but due attention and consideration will be accorded the allied fields of craft, design and teacher education.

The Report, scheduled for mid 1978, will include an assessment of the present situation in tertiary art education, (with an emphasis on the College of Advanced Education sector), under the broad headings indicated in the enclosed list. The Report will also examine and assess possible future changes and developments in tertiary art education, with a particular view to community needs and alternative models.

The Committee welcomes submissions from students, particularly but not exclusively students enrolled in visual arts courses, on matters relevant to the parameters of the Study,

The Committee emphasises however that this is an independent Study: it has not been commissioned within the structures of existing Commonwealth or State education authorities (although it seeks and has received for the most part the co-operation of such bodies) to advise on specific matters. The Study therefore has no authority of its own: it cannot and should not intervene in specific matters of policy relating to an individual institution. The Study can however provide a national platform for the views of artists, art educators and art students. The degree of response to the Study by those in authority will depend on the quality of its substance and the strength of its arguments. To that end it is essential that the views of the student body be made known.

I would like to point out an important error propagated in the most recent edition of RACE, in the article entitled "What The Hell Are We Doing".

Contrary to what the Author said there is no evidence to indicate that Cocaine or its derivatives produce physical dependency in people who use it or abuse it. There is, however, a great deal of evidence to show that some people do become psychologically dependent on Cocaine, in the same way that some people become psychologically dependent on many other products available in the community such as Religion, Work, Marijuana and Amphetamines, to mention only a few.

Among the substances that do produce physical dependency are the socially "acceptable" products Caffeine, Tobacco and Alcohol - as well as those more readily recognised for their inherent physical dangerousness - Aspirin, T.C.P., Bex, Barbiturates and the Narcotics (Opium, Morphine, Heroin, Pethedine, Methadone, etc.)

One of the major problems facing drug-abuse counsellors in their work is the amount of false, emotionally-derived information that is disseminated in the community by well-meaning individuals who don't know what they are talking about.

I would like to suggest to the Editors of RACE, and to anyone else who contemplates making statements of this sort, whether in articles or assignments, that they first make sure their "Facts" are correct. This is very easily done through the resources of the Information Exchange in the Union.
