

Dear Miss Swann,

The Oxford Dictionary reached me some time after our transfer to Victoria, & I have written to you on June 28<sup>th</sup> thanking you for it, & asking you how much I owed you. Since I have not heard from you, I am afraid that either yours or my letter has been lost. Mail is in fact working most irregularly. I thoroughly enjoy working with the help of the Oxford.

So far, nothing has changed with regard to my position. On July 31<sup>st</sup>, I have been notified officially of my release on grounds of my former anti-Nazi activities as a journalist, & yesterday, I have signed my willingness to travel back to the UK. Now, I am waiting more impatiently than ever, knowing that I might have to leave at a few hours notice, & that on the other hand it might as well last months or even years until my release substantiates. It all depends on whether there will be any shipping accommodation, & how things develop in the Pacific. A limited number of my funds have actually been sent back some time ago.

Hoping to hear from you soon, & thanking you very much once more,
