I was so glad to hear of your safe arrival at
Covindil. Please thank father for sending the doctor.
& Thank you very much for both your dear letters.
I am enclosing 2 stamps in this, as you may not
have any, are 20 for from a post office.
I hope Maud is none the worse for her journey &
Also hope her campus is better. Father will
pay for the ref. & teaching her to read & write.
I have had no letter from Charles for ages. Res.
He must have written, am afraid it's lost.

I asked Jack what message would he send you
& he said to tell you he would like to walk.
The Doctor is changing his medicines again.
he has had a lot of pain in his head lately.
It is getting quite cold here in the evenings.
I wonder what you did today. I expect father had
prayers & Sunday school.

Have they had much rain at Covindil? & if you
want medicine, take Epsom salts, or dandelions
& Clements tonic, & you will be well. Brush your teeth
after it. Give father my love, & Kate sends
hers to you. Another troop ship went out today.
Selwyn Miller cabled to his parents that he had
arrived all safe in London.

This wretched war does not look like ending

Army & the Russians are so unsettled. The Irish
people in Ireland the things are not going too well at
present, I am afraid our men will have a hard time.
In the next two or three months, but as Charlie says
that there are plenty of men in England & that's good.

Well it's after 11 o'clock dear & I must go to bed.
Do you want any warm underclothing?
