Thursday night

My dear Charlie

4 Sept. 1917

I'm expecting now shortly to hear you
have received the £100 I sent you.

I think I mentioned we cut out above the
20th Aug with 630 Rams off 31 thousand odd.
Well - There has been a rebellion strike
among many of the Vines, nominally
because the Govt. introduced the Tax System
into the Hair Work Shops. You gave Burnell
2/6 a head too much for his Ram Ewes.

The Balance 400 of them, are very light
I've sold ³⁵⁰ of them to Jas McWilliam at 17/-
in the Wool. What the Shearers ate of them
only weighed 35 lbs. & they are all fluky.

I'm sending the clip this year to Melbourne
because the River is a barrier, ^{our} the Midway, a
fortnight since could not take any wool.

We had it all stored in the Shed & in Cliffs
at Speed. I want to inoculate the cattle I'm
sending by road to the Long Plain, so I'm making
a crush inside the cattle yard - At last we
got peace by Dorellan for 5½ miles (half)
of Boundary Fence, but it required very great
patience & I had up my sleeve an action against
Miller for his beastly small cattle trespassing
in hedges & injuring the sheep's Flock. He
certainly is an "impossible" man to work with.

Can't say much for this house. Landlord dis-
appears & I can't get any paper. I see Federal
Income Tax against you is to goad which I will
pay. Dear I tell you the team of Brigadier is
dead. Peritoitis I believe.

Mrs. Robertson of Togarmah is not well either.
Garrison is good on the whole, albeit short.

This week the Italians appear to be giving
the Austrians fits, & it's not too late in the
Season for the defeat to be thoroughly effective.

Dear Hayes well & is very busy with
house, telephone, writing & reading.

I'm going for a few days to New England to inspect
a couple of Trucks of Billed Blackface for
Cawdron's Farm. With love in which Walter
joins
