My dear Walter

1st Feb. 1918

It was to accross you to Garia because you have been
given me your number & Regiment. Thanks for
your letter of 27 Jan. George Richards is back here
now & is nearly well, he had a piece of the bone of his
foot removed which has done him good. There is a
Housekeeper of the name of Shells here, a very capable
woman who has been here some 4 months. Then there
is a Boy Eustace Dowther to look after the horses & re-
gular too is as usual. I hear the grass on your land
is very good. The Stock except the old ones are fat.

Mr Proburgh (in host's name of J. S. Smith) the father of the Boy
who was at King's College, draws out the Wills of Men who
go to the front gratis, & if you like I'll give you a letter
to him - You see you have your Land here, your 6000
shares in Corribil Ltd, your Insurance for £500 I think

Now if you happened to be taken without leaving a
Wife, the Government would grab about £1600 of it, & if I
(as is natural) passed away before you, intestate (without a Will)
your Property might have to pay very heavily. So I suggest to you
to think what you will do for your Property to. At present its
value is about £8000. You might leave some 10% to the
Church at Canberra, or the Charles Campbell Trust for the Training of
the Clergy Diocese of Goulburn, or the Queanbeyan Hospital or to
your Mother or your Sister or any worthy object you like.
Corribil has paid a Dividend of £150 (an interim Div. of 6^d share on
6000 shares) to you & also to Kate - It is paid over to Granville Sharp
as Kate's & your Justice. The horses here look well & the air
is beautiful. There have been great Bush fires but fortunately
none has touched this. The wool is only now going to Sydney.
