Dear Father

As I wrote you last mail I will take the Coolmaine cattle except the workers. I enclose you a letter from Mr Bullivant which speaks for itself. I dare say I could arrange to have an eye kept on his country during the summer; no responsibility; if he cared to pay sufficient but winter is another matter. Anyway please let me know your opinion on the matter & return letter to me.

How are you going to send telephone wire & sundries to Coolmaine, I have a few things to go up to Long Plain so if you will let me know date you are sending wire from Invermont I can arrange to send my lot at the same time. I want them there by end of October if possible. We have cut out now about 490 bales & Clifford Downes are trying to shear but as it rained 85 pts last Friday & Saturday & seeds sown Tuesday & today they are not getting on very fast. Have just filled up ensilage pit & am cutting all bush hay I can, expect another mowing machine in a day or two

we are not out it quickly enough with one so it is going to send first now. Hope both well. Things started for Melbourne safely to home.
