Dear Walter

I have not heard from you for some
time, and wonder if you got my last letter,
which you should have received some time, at
the end of January. I think you have lost
it, in this hurry to British Secretary

Buchanan, are going through a very anxious time
of it, and I dare say the fall in prices has
caused you a lot of worry. For a time, we, in
this country are rather pleased, at all the talk
of the Labour Government, but Republican, but
the recent speeches of the British in London
appear to have rather lowered prices, lower.
of all Buchanan loans, had a drastic
fall, and as there is about 400 millions of British
Capital, invested in Buchanan Securities, on the London
market, the position is serious. I shall be very
glad to hear what you think of the position, and

whether you think the steps taken by the
Government will meet the situation. I am glad
to hear that you have had good rains
and I hope the country is getting well -

I have now retired from business,
and am able to enjoy a little leisure, after a
pretty strenuous life. My health, however, has
in this country has been increased, and
this suits me, as I have to depend on the
income from my investments. The prospect of
having to pay further is not pleasant.

I am just writing a short letter,

with all the troubles you must be having in
Burmah. Please remember me to your mother and
