I was so pleased to get your
letter with Charlie's enclosed.

As I st^t too together from
Charlie by this last mail written
the 8th, 11th y^r. he was well &
had seen Silvyn Miller. He
said Silvyn looks much better
than when he left Australia.

I have just been speaking to
Mrs Miller on the telephone. &
she had three letters from Silvyn
which she has passed & came out of.

I think she said so that is
good. & he will either go to
Palestine or Africa. They
get their choice. But it does
not look as if the war
was to end for another year.
I expect you will stay at Red
Hill until Wednesday morn.
Also. I hope they do well, ~~but~~
anyway it will give a good
many people pleasure
Mr & Miss Ross are leaving
~~to~~ Sydney in Red Hill tonight.
One will be quite a far party.

You will like Mr Ross he is
so cheerful. & Miss Ross is
very bright too.
When you come down I get
your teeth fitted up. & have
a rest, & if the Doctor sees
you. & you get into his sight
~~the~~ those. & they should at
any time, want you to change
from that into something
else after you leave us, I
want you to promise me
you won't change. as many
might come against you

too, & father had an idea of
the British Army stick to the
Australians stick to your own
part of the Empire. & be
true to your Country, our Mother
I got Fairfax. Roberts to put your
little miniatures Coloured Photographs
into a little ~~old~~ gold frame & send
it as a brooch, your birthday present
to me, thank you dear old boy.

I am afraid this letter may be
late Kate thinks so am sorry
The butter & flowers arrived this
morning I am writing to Miss
Simpson to thank her for the butter.
Father left yesterday for New England I hope he
won't lose his luggage again, we are naturally
right all safe nothing missing.
